

FLOW CHART FOR MANAGING CONFIRMED OR SUSPECTED COVID CASES

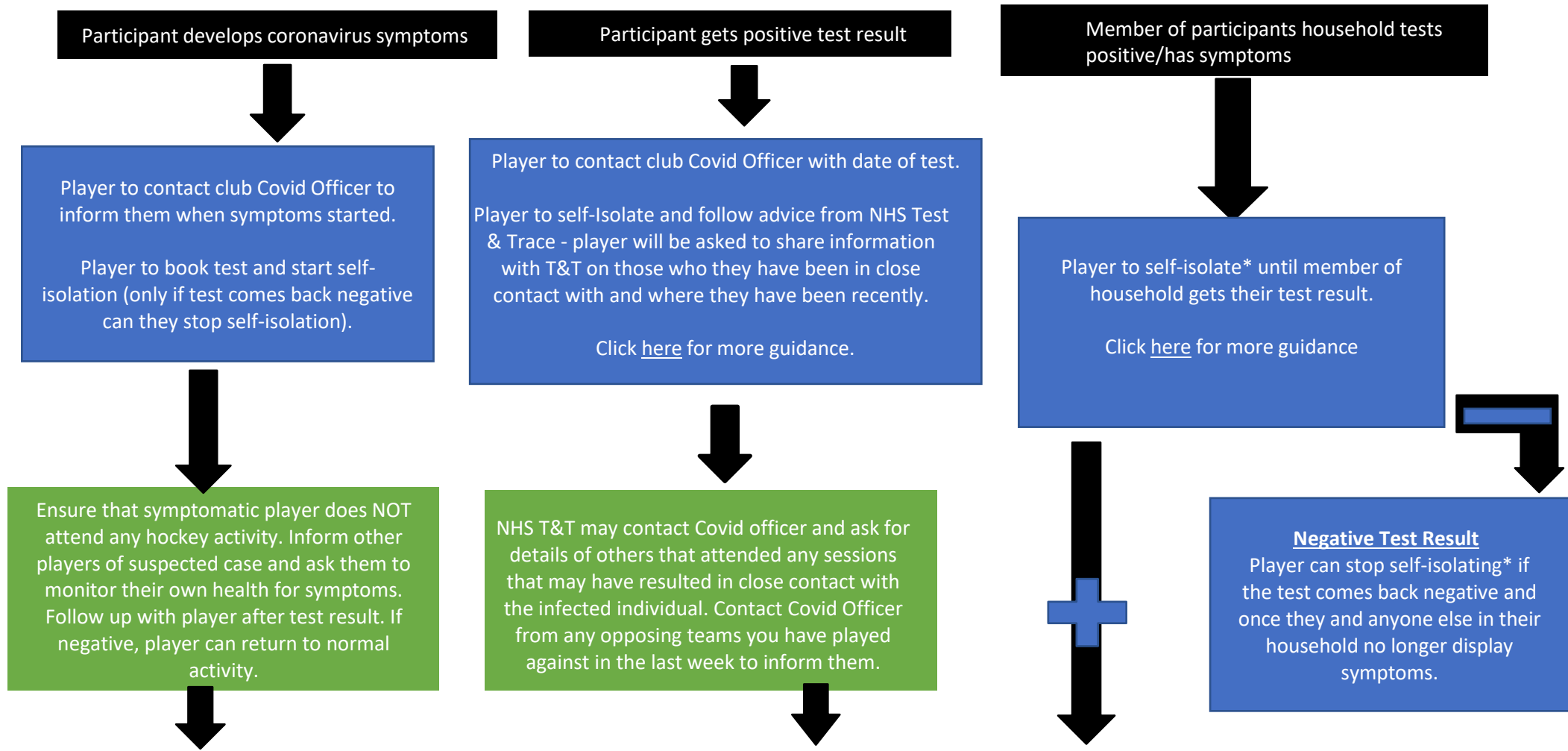
Participant actions

Definition of 'close contact':

Within 2m or less of a positive person for more than 15 minutes continuously (e.g. car sharing/waiting together at venue/teas/spectators).

Covid Officer actions

It is unlikely that players will reach the 15-minute threshold during a game or training session, but this may need to be considered on an individual basis.



NHS Test & Trace will advise close contacts of positive test individual to self-isolate*. If players are not contacted by NHS T&T they DO NOT need to self-isolate and can continue normal activities.

Positive Test Result/No Test Result
Self-isolate* in accordance with NHS guidelines.
Inform club Covid Officer that they are self-isolating due to a positive case in their household and DO NOT return to training until self-isolation period is complete and they are symptom free.

***Self-isolation after close contact**

From 16 August rules around self-isolating after coming into contact with a symptomatic or positive person change.

You no longer need to self-isolate if:

- You are fully vaccinated^
- You are below the age of 18 years, 6 months
- You have taken part in or are currently part of an approved Covid-19 vaccine trial
- You are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons

NHS T&T will still contact you to inform you that you have been identified as a close contact and check whether you are legally required to self-isolate and advise that you take a test. Full Government guidance [here](#).

^Fully vaccinated means that you have been vaccinated with an MHRA approved Covid-19 vaccine in the UK, and at least 14 days have passed since you received the recommended doses of that vaccine.
